Tools in Windows

Disk Cleanup – Start, Programs, Accessories, System Tools, and Disk-Cleanup – Frees hard drive space by eliminating unnecessary files in-Wi8n98/Me/2000/XP.

Disk Defragmenter – Open My Computer, right-click a disk icon, selectproperties, click the Tools tab, and click Defragment Now button –

Organizes hard drive files for improved performance in Win 2000/XP. Registry Editor – Start, click RUN, type in Regedit.exe or Regedit32. exeand press Enter for direct access to the Windows Registry to add, remove, or edit configuration settings in Win95/98/Me/2000/XP

Safe Mode – Press F8 during initial boot [F5 for Win95] – Loads a simplified configuration, so you can circumvent serious system problemsand get to your data in Win95/98/Me/2000/XP.

Scan Disk - Open My Computer, right-click a disk icon, select Properties.click the Tools tab. and click Check Now ... button. Checks for and repairsproblems with hard drive files in Win2000/XP. For Win95/98/ Me clickStart, Programs, Accessories, System Tools, and ScanDisk.System Configuration Utility - Start, RUN, type in Msconfig.exe and pressEnter. Lets you view and edit startup files and selectively disablesetting and application to aid in system troubleshooting in Win98/Me/XP.System File Checker – Start, RUN, type in Sfc.exe /scannow and press Enter in Win2000/XP. Start, Programs, Accessories, System Tools, and SystemInformation; then System File Checker from the Tools menu in Win98/Me. Checks for damaged or missing system files, and lets you replace anychanged file with original versions.

System Information – Start, Programs, Accessories, System Tools, andSystem Information for detailed information on system hardware, software, and settings serves as launching point for various system utilities in-

Win98/Me/2000/XP. Alternate is Start, RUN, type in Msinfor32.exe andpress Enter.

System Restore – Start, Programs, Accessories, System Tools, and SystemRestore in WinMe/XP. Lets you undo changes by restoring system setting to a previous state.

Network Diagnostics – Start, Programs, Accessories, System Tools, andSystem information; click on Net Diagnostics from the Tools menu. Scanssystem for network hardware and software configuration information in XP.

Backup – Start, Programs, Accessories, System Tools, and Backup or Start,RUN, type in Msbackup. exe for Win98/ME. Backup.exe for Win95 orNtbackup.exe for 2000/XP, to protect against system failure by backing up

applications and data to tape, disk, or network.

GETTING STARTED WITH XP

Empty My Recent Documents

"My Recent Documents" holds the last 15 items that you opened. You can delete individual items by Right-clicking then choosing "Delete"), but the number stays at fifteen. That's because the contents are in a hidden file called "Recent" that is stored in your user profile. With Windows XP you have some options:

To clear this list right-click the Start button, choose "Properties", and then click "Customize". Next click the "Advanced" tab and click "Clear List". This deletes all the files. While you're there, you can also remove "My Recent Documents" from the Start menu by clearing the checkbox for "List My Most Recently Opened Documents"

Before you decide to remove "My Recent Documents" from the Start menu you may want to try using it to quickly open the last documents you have worked with. It can be a real time saver

Windows Vista

Windows Vista is the next version of Microsoft's Windows operating system, superseding Windows XP. It was previously known by its codename Longhorn. Early in June, 2001, the software designers at Microsoft envisioned a minor upgrade to Windows XP. In early 2002 Microsoft decided to make a major upgrade with new security architecture, a hardware 3D-enabled user interface, and many more exciting new features. The scheduled release date is set for late 2006.

A few years back, Microsoft concentrated on two different operating systems, one for the casual or home user and a more robust operating system for business. With the Windows XP operating system, they combined the two into one operating system with a common kernel or core and different features added to suit the intended purpose. That way there is a single team working on the system and if problems occur, then more people are familiar with the system to make corrections.

As it stands now, there will be nine editions available, two of which will be only available in Europe (the N Editions). The N Editions will not contain Windows Media Player as is mandated by European law.

The Starter Edition is limited to emerging markets and is severely limited in that it will only allow the user to launch three applications at once and is the only edition that will not support 64-bit processors.

Home Basic Edition is similar to Windows XP Home Edition for budget users not requiring advanced media support for home use.

Home Basic Edition N is the same as **Home Basic Edition** without Windows Media Player.

Home Premium Edition is based on Home Basic Edition with more advanced features aimed for the home market segment, such as DVD authoring and HDTV support.

Professional Edition is comparable to Windows XP Professional and is aimed at the business market.

Professional Edition N is identical to **Professional Edition** without Windows Media Player.

Small Business Edition is for the small business that doesn't have an IT staff. It will contain a number of integrated system maintenance features just

Enterprise Edition is for the large business and functions like a superset of the **Professional Edition**. It will contain a multilingual interface and Microsoft's Virtual PC system virtualization software.

Ultimate Edition will work as a superset of the Home Edition and Professional Edition. It will contain a game performance tweaker, DVD ripping capabilities, and possibly support special online support for downloadable media. The Ultimate Edition is the top-of-the-line edition of Vista. It is the one for the high-end PC user, gamer, multimedia professional, or PC enthusiast.

Some of the newest features will be the 3D rendering of graphics.

There will be scalable live icons (icons can be enlarged or reduced in size).

Command bars display only the tasks most appropriate for the files being displayed.

Document Explorer makes working with your files easier. Find your files faster and see what they contain without having to open them.

Windows Flip and Windows Flip 3D. Windows Flip allows you to flip through open windows (with Alt+Tab), providing a thumbnail of each window. With Windows Flip 3D, you use the scroll wheel on your mouse to flip through open windows in a stack to locate and select the one you want to work with.

Windows Vista will have picture editing capabilities built in including video editing. Camera RAW format can be used without an add-in.

Internet Explorer 7 is new to Windows Vista. It provides tabbed browsing and live previews. With Windows Vista's User Account Protection and IE7, IE7 has just enough permission to browse the Web, but not enough to modify your files or settings – keeping your PC safer from Web based attacks. This means that malicious sites can not install software, copy files, or hijack the settings for your browser or search provider.

There are so many other features in Microsoft Windows Vista; there is not enough room here to cover them. I will try to write another article that will cover, in depth, some new features.

There may be additions or subtractions to the released products, after all Vista is still in testing.
