~A QUICK TIP~**Typing URL Addresses**

* Type the domain of an address, such as Microsoft, and then press Ctrl+ENTER. Internet Explorer, and some other browsers, automatically wraps "http://www....com" around what you typed.

* Not sure if the site uses a .com extension? Just type the domain of the ad-

dress, and then press ENTER. Internet Explorer tries to find the site by using the various extensions.

* If you need to edit an address, you can use Ctrl+LEFT ARROW and Ctrl+RIGHT ARROW to easily move between different parts of the address separated by periods.

Trouble In AVG Land

When it comes to Antivirus programs, the gold standard for the vast majority of us is AVG. Most people I know are using the AVG Free version. It does most of the basic stuff and provides adequate protection against most of the threats that come your way on a daily basis. You could upgrade to AVG Pro, in fact, they are always bugging you to do that. Of course you have to buy it and you don't get any additional protection. Actually, I found that version to be rather bloated with features that you really don't need. So for the record, and the sake of argument, lets just concede that the Free Version is the best for most users. But lately, there has been a cloud on the AVG horizon. Apparently, when I first log on my computer every day, it checks the AVG website and downloads whatever update is available. They are always coming out with new definitions, so there is almost always an update. The problem occurs later on, say around 8 or 9 AM. Apparently it tries to go out and check for another update. This is when I get a little red icon in my systray telling me that the update (I guess it is the last one) failed. The reason is always because it lost the connection. The first time it happened, I checked my modem and my internet connection to make sure that something didn't go hay-wire in midstream. Things were working OK. I am not sure of the exact reason, but I suspect that they have more people getting updates

than they are able to get them out. In other words, their lines of communication are jammed. This may not be as serious as it sounds. Generally, if you just do nothing, it will fix itself. Eventually the update will get to you and everything will be as it was. But I do not like to see any error messages, so I usually try to manually update it. The last couple of days I was successful but there have been times when I was not able to. I still think that AVG is probably the best out there for doing what you need it to. But maybe they need to look at providing the updates in a different manner so that a person doesn't think there is something wrong with their connection or computer. I know this sounds like I am just looking a gift horse in the mouth but nothing can be further from the truth. I will continue to use this program and have the peace of mind knowing that I am pretty much protected from most of the bad guys out there.

GETTING STARTED TIPS

Terminate Application

Use Windows Task Manager to end an unresponsive or hanged application.

1. Press Ctrl-Alt-Delete keys simultaneously in Windows XP or Ctrl-Alt-Esc in Windows Vista.

Alternatively, right click on taskbar and select Task Manager. You can also start Task Manager by manually starting "taskmgr" from Run command in Start Menu.

2. In the Windows Task Manager window, under Applications, locate and select (highlight) the application or program that's not responding..

3. Click on End Task.

4. A Task Manager Warning dialog saying "Terminating a process can cause undesired results including loss of data and system instability. The process will not be given the chance to save its state or data before it is terminated. Are you sure you want to terminate the process?" will appear. Confirm the process by clicking on OK or End Now.

At Your Service

I am sure that all of us are familiar with turning on and off services. You simply type services.msc in the search box. Next right click and choose properties. If the service is running choose stop, then the type of start up you want can now be selected. That's pretty simple, only one little problem. What services are not needed or what type of start up do I need? Vista Services Optimizer can answer these questions.

Vista Services Optimizer is a free open source tweaking utility that allows you to improve Vista's performance and security with a few simple mouse clicks. With Vista Services Optimizer you can safely optimize Windows services, it takes the guess work out of tweaking Vista services. Vista's default installation has many services turned on that you may not need. These services can consume CPU cycles and memory that will slow down your system. Vista Services Optimizer analyzes your system and suggest services that can be safely turned off. You can perform an automatic tune-up according to the way you use your computer and the software installed on your computer, or use the manual tune-up that lets you select from a more detailed list of features to

disable. If you encounter any problems or just want to return Vista to default settings, simply use the Rescue Center, which allows you to restore Windows services to their default settings at any time.

The program does not require any special technical knowledge. It only requires you to answer a few simple questions that relate to how you use your computer. It is no longer Beta software, Vista Services Optimizer 1.1.18 Final was released on January 10, 2009. You can find a free download at: <http://smartpcutilities.bravehost.com/downloads.html>.

File size is only 2.56 MB. System requirements include Windows Vista Home/Business/Ultimate Editions with Service Pack 1 and will run on 32 or 64 bit processors. Requires a screen resolution of 1024 x 768, however 1440 x 900 is recommended. You will need Microsoft .NET Framework 3.5 with Service Pack 1 and Adobe Reader 5.x or higher installed.

If you have a sluggish Vista, this little program may be just what you need to add some vitality to Vista.
